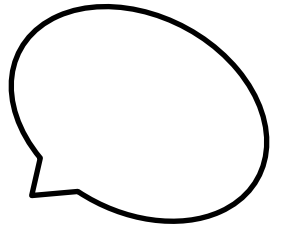

Did You Know...
